In 1901, Moses Nakuina published the tradition of Kū-a-Pāka'a and the supernatural wind-gourd of La'amaomao (Ka-ipu-makani-o-Laa-mao-mao), entitled "Moolelo Hawaii o Pakaa a me Ku-a-Pakaa na Kahu Iwikuamoo o Keawenuiaumi Ke Alii o Hawaii, a o na Moopuna hoi a Laamaomao!" which translates as the section title above.

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Described as a gourd which held the powdered bones of the Akua Noho Loa, the goddess of the winds of the Pele Family, progenitor of the winds, the bones were placed within the gourd to be daily prayed to and imbued with spirit and energy, allowing the spirit existing in the bones to grow and strengthen itself into a powerful spirit that acts as an interceding force on behalf of the Kahu, or keeper of the spirit. The Kahu of the gourd was originally the priestess La'amaomao, who gave it to her ...

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
